What to Do About Dísuníty in the Church?

It would have been a cool spring night for prayer and also a quiet one because the others were asleep. Despite the quiet and the cool night air, Jesus, in deep anxiety, was sweating drops like blood. He returned to those who slumbered and said, "Watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation..." (Matt 26:41 NKJV). Moments before His betrayal, Jesus was still deeply concerned for His disciples and encouraged them to remain watchful. A study of Jesus' final words leading up to His sacrifice reveals some of His deepest concerns.

As Jesus said, we are to be watchful. More specifically, we are to remain watchful for our adversary, the devil (1 Pet 5:8). The devil is always at work to cause issues with the bride of Christ, His church. If we are watchful, as Jesus has encouraged us to be, we can head off the devil and resist him much more easily. Across the brotherhood, I have noticed that in some areas, strife and dissension have been allowed to brew: strife within the congregation or even strife between whole congregations of the Lord's church. God forbid those of us who wear the name of Christ to continue to live in this sin.

What is the cause of this evil? Those who are watchful have noticed that there is a lack of Christian unity. Jesus, before His arrest according to the Gospel According to John, prayed to the Father for unity to continue between His disciples and those who would later hear their inspired teachings, like us. "I do not pray for these alone, but also for those who will believe in Me through their word; that they all may be one, as You, Father, are in Me, and I in You; that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that You sent Me" (John 17:20-21, emp. mine).

We come to believe in the Lord by hearing the word (Rom 10:17), and as the Scripture proclaims, it is also through the word we are made one. Godly unity only exists through the word of God. We are to be unified in truth, which is the word of God (John 17:17). We cannot be unified based on our feelings. We cannot be unified based on our opinions. We cannot be unified based on our personal desires. As Christians, we follow the teachings given in Scripture alone. The Scripture says we are to be unified based on the authority of Jesus Christ. "Now I plead with you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Cor 1:10, emp. mine).

When brethren are unified based on Scripture alone, you will not see the strife, contention, gossip, and every evil thing that disunity fuels. Thanks to pride and being unskilled in the word, we can see these evil things in the church (1 Cor 3:1-4; Jas 3:13-18). When we turn our back on Scripture or fail to remain in the Good Book, then we are giving up the one major thing that binds us together: the Word. Jesus is the word (John 1:14), and we are to be firmly rooted in Him (Col 2:6-7).

We are the church that Jesus built, "...the pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Tim 3:15). Let us never become lazy and slip away from leaning on the word of God for all our authority in religion. Nor become ashamed of the gospel. There is no unity in anything else. Let there be no divisions among us, and let us be perfectly joined together by the authority of Jesus Christ. So, what are we to do about disunity in the church? The answer is to address the problem by going back to the Bible.

DOUG'S DISCUSSION

<u>Carefully Free</u>

Let's say someone is shopping near you at the supermarket, and they are clearly and abundantly happy. I'm not sure how you know that . . . maybe they're whistling while they shop. Maybe they don't have the same "I really wish I didn't have to do this right now" frown everyone else has. Instead, there's a twinkle in their eye, and they smile and say hello to people as they pass them in the aisle. Just as you're wondering what has got into this person, they say as you walk by, "Isn't Jesus wonderful?" Perhaps it was only half said to you, half to themselves – but now you have a clue as to what has brightened this person's day.

How about it? Would you say, as you go throughout your day, that Jesus is indeed wonderful? I think with a lot of people, a much more likely thought is that the whistler in the supermarket is very strange. Who really thinks about Jesus while they are shopping? Or anytime, really, other than perhaps during church? From the time we wake up until the time we go to bed, there are things that need to be done. On the rare occasion when there isn't something that needs to be done, there is something that we want to do. By the time we finish buying those groceries and watching our shows, it's well past time for bed. Instead of contemplating the beauty of Jesus our hearts dwell on the crushing weight of all we must do and want to do and can't do and won't have time to do and do but shouldn't do. Jesus warns against such things: "Be careful, or your hearts will be weighed down with dissipation, drunkenness and the anxieties of life, and this day will close on you unexpectedly like a trap" (Luke 21:34).

My friends, too many of our hearts are not free. If you have no ability to contemplate the glorious love of Christ while you're picking up tonight's dinner at Kroger, then I fear you are a slave to lowly worldly concerns. "So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed" (John 8:36). If a sinful practice has led us to have most or even all of our attention on how we can best

maintain our immoral habits, then of course we have no time in the day to think of the glory of Jesus! Jesus says, "Be careful." Our hearts can be weighed down in many ways. There are so many that someone who actually does think about Jesus (and is consequentially joyful) appears wildly out of place. But that person, that stranger here, is one of the few people prepared for something that will happen someday.

> One day, Jesus will return, and all these worldly things we filled our minds with will be no more. Are you free to think about that day? If so, I imagine you're looking forward to it. Otherwise, that day will forcefully arrive in the lives of those who had no room in their schedule for Jesus. Not even space for a stray thought or two! But then the

trap springs shut, and there is all the time in the world to think about what should have mattered. Be careful. Be free indeed.
