DANA'S DIRECTION WHAT DO YOU EXPECT IN WORSHIP?

It's Sunday. You have made your way to the assembly of the saints. You enter the door, find a seat, and wait for the service to begin. Is this just going to be a way of killing an hour, or would something more important happen? Geoffrey Wainwright in his book *Doxology* has given me food for thought by listing eight 'attitudes' which typically occur in Christian worship.

- 1. **Adoration**. There is the acknowledgement of God's transcendence. Our response is: "Come let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6)
- 2. **Confession of sin**. How can we be in the presence of the Holy One without acknowledging our failed potential and missed opportunities? There should be penitence in our hearts and the confession of sin upon our lips.
- 3. **Proclamation and thanksgiving**. The address of proclamation is to the world; the address of thanksgiving is to God. Yet these things are closely related because proclamation and thanksgiving typically recite the mighty acts of God on behalf of humanity and His benefits bestowed on us.
 - 4. **Commitment**. We are offering ourselves to God in obedience for His service.
- 5. **Intercession**. God's commitment to the world is shown by His very creation of it, by His continuing preservation of it, and by His redemption of it through Jesus Christ. But human intercessions are addressed to God from within situations in which it appears, at least to human eyes, that the divine will for the well-being of the creatures is suffering frustration.
- 6. **Expectation**. "I will lift up my eyes . . ." (Psalm 121:1). When the believer looks to God he is expecting help.
- 7. **Absence**. The sense of God's absence implies a relationship. This leads toward a search for God and a positive response to His call. Wainwright points out that paradox can give way to plain *doxa*. He says, "There are many indications in the New Testament that this is the pattern which believers must and may expect. Apparent god-forsakenness, of which suffering is the sharpest sign, may in fact be a moment of growth in communion with the God who is never really absent from a creation which he never ceases to love."
- 8. **Wrestling**. Human wrestling with God in prayer. Remember Jacob's night-long wrestling at Penuel (Gen. 32)

I hope you will examine yourself next Sunday and see how many of these eight 'attitudes' you find present as your worship.

WHAT SHOULD A FATHER DO?



Fathers are a strange lot. They get up early and leave the house; they don't come home until the close of day.

I sensed early on in life that daddy was important. He didn't stay at home as mother did, but he seemed in control of the family. There was no question in my mind that you did what daddy said. Mother taught it; Dad enforced it.

Later, when I became a father, I began to sense the awesome responsibility of providing for one's family. There was housing to be secured, food for the table, and clothing for the body. But that was only the beginning. Something much larger was at stake—the eternal welfare of every member of the family. Being the "head" of the house was no matter to be taken lightly. Thankfully, I found a handbook for fathers—the same one my father used—the Bible. I wasn't perfect, but the Book was. I still recommend that Book for every trying to raise a family. It will give you insights at every turn in the road.

For example, take the statement of the apostle Paul: "For you know how, like a father with his children, we exhorted each one of you and encouraged you and charged your to lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory" (I Thessalonians 2:11-12).

In these verses three verbs are connected with the role of the father: exhorted, encouraged, and charged. Children need to be exhorted to a life of right conduct. They need to be encouraged in their pursuit of that goal. And they need the authoritative charge of their father (God chose Abraham because He knew that Abraham would "charge his children and his household after him, to keep the way of the Lord by doing righteousness and justice" (Genesis 18:19).

There is no job more important for any father than that of teaching his children "to lead a life worthy of God."



FEATURED BOOK OF THE WEEK...

When a person seeks a book to read, commentaries usually do not come to mind. Commentaries are mostly reference material. Wayne Jackson's book, <u>Before I Die (Paul's Letter to Timothy and Titus)</u> bridges this great divide. This is an easy-to-read style of presentation, yet it does not gloss over important doctrinal matters.

This book offers elders an opportunity to understand their role and divine qualifications, including cleaver insight into duties and dangers that exist. To those who proclaim the Word, there should be renewed passion for preaching, lending to a renewed sense of dedication. For all Christians, it will teach them to work as a team, each observing his or her role and to appreciate the role of others, in particular, the shepherds.

This book is time and money that is well spent.

These are reactions consistent with what the world teaches us. The world says "do to the other guy before they do something to you. Get even. Show them that they are no better than you."

But you know something; this is completely inconsistent with what Jesus taught Christians they should do! Jesus taught is by example to pray for our enemies. When on the cross, Jesus didn't lash out at his enemies, he prayed for them. (Matthew 18:35) Jesus also asked God to forgive those who were crucifying Him. Now THAT is completely contrary to what most of us would do! We must follow Jesus' example. Never forget what Jesus said in Mark 11:25, "If you have anything against anyone, forgive him, that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses."
