



"TWO LESSONS CHURCH LEADERS SHOULD LEARN FROM WINNING COACHES..."

Over the years, I have had the opportunity to visit with a number of outstanding sports coaches. These are men and women who have led their teams (participating in a variety of sports) to winning seasons. Each coach has his or her own style and personality but each share two common characteristics.

#1. They believe in their players.

I can always tell the difference between a winning team or a losing team in sports. The winners have leaders that are positive and believe that their players can and will live up to their full potential. And the coaches tell their players this.

The church is no different. Elderships, preachers, teachers and "opinion leaders" in each congregation need to be positive about what can be accomplished. Consider the positive attitude that Paul showed the young evangelist Timothy. He said, "I know the faith that your grandmother and mother have and I am certain that same sincere faith is yours" (2 Timothy 1:5). Consider some other phrases Paul used to indicate a positive belief in fellow Christians: "confident of your obedience" (Philemon 1:21), "we boast of you" (2 Thessalonians 1:4), "your faith is proclaimed in all the world" (Romans 1:8), etc.

This does not mean that Paul did not criticize. He did. But he usually started out each letter with a genuine, positive comment about his readers. He then pointed out their short comings. And then concluded with another genuinely positive comment. This "sandwich" is used by the best sport coaches. And is should be part of every spiritual leader's character.

Besides telling their players what they did wrong, the best coaches go one step farther.

#2. They concentrate on showing how each player can improve skills instead of just telling them to do the job.

Some coaches' idea of sports training is to stick an athlete at a position and tell them to "do the job." But this is ridiculous if the athlete has not been given the basic skills to fulfill the task. A baseball player needs to know the proper way to catch a ball using "cradling." A football player needs to know how to set to make the correct block. A tennis player needs to understand the grip and follow-through.

Likewise, when a member of the church is told to do something, he or she should be shown how. Some men don't lead public prayer because they haven't been taught the basics of doing the task. And many people do not evangelize, not because they don't want to, but because they haven't been shown how.


If a leadership wants people to make more visits, then perhaps they should start by simply calling a member and saying: "I'm going to the hospital to see our brother in Christ. Would you like to go?"

That type of training is worth ten personal evangelism classes.

The Potter's Wheel

The Scripture tells us in Isaiah 64:8, "but now, O Lord, thou art our Father; we the clay, and thou our potter; and we all are the work of thy hand."

While living on the Gulf Coast of Mississippi there was an older gentleman in our congregation who was a potter by profession. The little town of Ocean Springs is a craft town where many artisans' live and work. He and his wife were the owners of a pottery store in the downtown area.

One night our young people were invited to their home for a devotional. As a parent I went along to see what the story being told would bring. As I had thought he took the teens to his shop and sat down at the potter's wheel. We often sing a beautiful song in worship about the potter molding the clay. He began his talk by placing a piece of clay on the moving wheel. It was just a lump of clay, with no shape at all. As he worked the clay he talked of Jesus and how He is our potter and we are the clay. He said that Jesus looks at us the same way he looks at the clay on his wheel. He anticipates what will emerge and hopes for a beautiful piece to come together but he can never tell until it is finished. He took his hands and encircled the clay and began very gently to mold it. He worked the bottom then the sides and the top never forgetting to have his hands on the inside of the pottery to help hold it and shape it. Always adding water as his hands and the clay dried out, he again worked from the bottom as he moved his skillful hands up the sides once more. Soon we began to see the results of his work. He explained to our young people how our Savior does the same thing when we love and obey Him. He molds us and shapes us inside and out into a Christian, pure and undefiled by the world. Soon a beautiful piece of pottery came into being, perfectly formed and useful to its owner. Are we useful to our owner? After all we are bought with a price. "For ye are bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Corinthians 6:2-). Do our lives reflect the Potter's intent for us?

As he completed the piece he asked our teens to call out some words that depicted sin. From the group came words such as: drugs, sex, drinking, using bad language, immodest dressing and smoking. With every word that was called out he took a tiny piece of clay and threw it onto the pottery to make is misshapen and ugly and finally useless. We watched intently as the pottery collapsed in on itself. He explained this is what sin will do to the Potter's work. He quietly removed the broken piece and placed another lump of clay on the wheel. Without a word he formed another piece of pottery and removed it from the wheel.

Our lesson? Jesus lovingly molds us but if we let sin reign in our lives it will destroy everything the Potter intends for us. Jesus our Savior wants us to live for Him and be useful in His Kingdom. Is sin creeping in and destroying us from within? Is our heart right with God? "Keep thy heart with all diligence: for out of it are the issues of life" (Proverbs 4:23). Where will our home be after this life is over? Look for the shape the Potter made you, are you still that shape or has sin collapsed the Potter's creation? "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23).
