

C.Y.C. 2019

Last weekend our youth and some of our adults, about 48 in total, had a great opportunity to travel to Pigeon Forge, TN and enjoy a time of fellowship, worship, and spiritual renewal at the Challenge Youth Conference (C.Y.C.). This was C.Y.C.'s twentieth anniversary and in that time C.Y.C. has grown to two sessions were approximately 6,000 – 7,000 people attend each session. This year's theme was "Unashamed", and the Bible lessons centered around how we as Christians are to live out our faith for Christ in our everyday life and not be ashamed of Him. The lessons were powerful, the singing was excellent, and the fellowship was great.

This was only my third year to attend C.Y.C. and I believe this was probably the best year I experienced so far. I appreciate so much our elders, allowing me and our congregation to participate in this event and really appreciate Jeff and Julie Taberner, Scott and Gwen Johnson, Bill Mills, and the so many others who organized, drove, provided, and helped cook meals, provided funds, and chaperoned this trip. Our group would not be able to experience C.Y.C. without these individuals' hard work and dedication to our youth and congregation. Thank you!

Events like C.Y.C. need to take place from time to time in the life of the congregation, not just to hear excellent sermons and great singing, but to bond with each other and to fellowship with other Christians. One thing that gets overlooked in events like this is what takes place during the journey to and from the C.Y.C. as well as what happens at C.Y.C. There is fellowshipping with each other, bonding, and getting to know one another. It is meeting challenges such as we had with the rain and wind and what do you do when you must change your schedule; as we did this past weekend. It is sharing meals together and eating together. It is praying together and having devotionals in the hotel. All this is a part of C.Y.C. and the faith building that takes place during this trip.

C.Y.C. is most definitely a spiritually encouraging trip, it is a spiritual mountain top moment. Yet, as I am reminded with physical mountains; as awe inspiring as they are; one cannot live on the mountain peaks. They are just places to visit, observe, and enjoy for a moment. The trees, grass, flowers, and animals live in the valleys. Spiritual growth happens when it is lived in the valleys; the day to day responsibilities as we choose to make decisions based on our faith in Christ.

Don't get me wrong, we need a C.Y.C. mountain top experience, they help keep us going, but we must remember living for Christ, is choosing to live for Christ each day, unashamed, in the valley. We can always live better for Christ when we have had a "taste" of the joy of the Lord as we did at C.Y.C. but let us remember to live each day for Christ, and not be ashamed of Him wherever we may be found. DOUG'S DISCUSSION



Unashamed of Jesus

Almost fifty people from Camden Avenue attended Challenge Youth Conference last weekend. We heard a lot about being unashamed. That message is certainly relevant in a world that does not approve of passionate Christianity. A faith that you keep confined within the church walls is fine. You can get away with a faith that you never talk about or act upon at school or at work. But then we have to ask: is that really faith at all? "Faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). True, living faith will cost you something. You cannot have the world and God – living faith demands that you choose.

I'm sure that there are plenty of people across America willing to admit that there is something to this Jesus guy. The evidence for Him is pretty overwhelming after all. This admission may lead some of these people to church. Perhaps their thoughts are something like "Well, this is probably true, so I better do something to make sure I'm okay with God." One pew after another gets filled with those who have made a commitment for two hours on Sunday morning because they know enough to admit that Jesus came and died for them. But, as one of the CYC speakers proclaimed on Saturday: "We don't need people who ADMIT Jesus is the Son of God, we need people who CONFESS Jesus is the Son of God." Or, as Jesus says, "Whoever acknowledges me before men, I will also acknowledge him before my father in heaven" (Matthew 10:32).

There should be no question in people's minds about whether or not we are a Christian. Our willingness to speak about Church, the Bible, God, and many other spiritual topics should be a light that shines into the darkness. Our excellent moral conduct and good deeds should be another powerful clue. Just admitting our faith is true implies a reluctance. "Yeah, all-right God, you got me. I can't deny it. What's the minimum I have to do to keep you happy?" Instead, we boldly confess our love for the Lord with our words and with our life. Will it cost us some worldly things? I'm sure it will. But what price is not worth it if it means gaining Jesus? I pray that I always proclaim for all to hear: "I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes" (Romans 1:16).
