Tonk Talk by Mark T. Tonkery

<u>H.O.P.E.S</u>

One of the great needs of the church today is for our members to be more evangelistic. We have more people living in our world today and yet fewer people becoming Christians and being involved in the life of the church. There are people all around us, we have neighbors, co-workers, family, and friends who are not Christians. Most of us talk with these people every day, yet when was the last time we had a spiritual conversation with them? Talking about God, Christ, the church, and the Bible can be challenging even awkward, especially if we are not in the habit of talking about our faith. So how can we take our daily conversations with our friends from everyday concerns to a spiritual discussion? The following is a helpful acronym that may be able to help us. When you are talking with someone think of the word H.O.P.E.S.

 \cdot <u>H – Home</u>. Talk to your friends about their family, their children, grandchildren, and the places they have lived; share this information about yourself with them as well. Show them that you are genuinely concerned and interested in their family and their home. \cdot <u>O - Occupation</u>. Talk to your friends about their job, what they do for a living, how their day at work went. If they have served in the military or went to college, ask them about their experience. Share your work and life experiences with them too.

 \cdot <u>P - Preferences</u> – Talk to your friends about their likes and dislikes, foods they like or dislike to eat, restaurants they may like to go to or want to avoid. Ask them about the type of car they like to drive, or their favorite holiday. Share your likes and dislikes with them also.

 \cdot <u>E - Entertainment</u> – Talk to your friends about their hobbies, places they like to go on vacation, ask them to share their vacation memories, and talk about what they like to do when they have a day off. Share your common interests and things that you like to do for entertainment as well.

 \cdot <u>S</u> – <u>Story</u> – Talk to your friends about their religious beliefs, talk about where they grew up going to church, or if they ever went to church. Ask them if they ever have become a Christian, ask them how they became a Christian or why they are not a Christian. Have them share their faith and religious story with you. And then as you listen to their story, ask them if you can share how, you became a Christian, and why you believe what you believe. Point them to the scriptures and use this opportunity to set up a Bible study with them and invite them to come to worship services with you.

The next time you are talking to a friend, remember H.O.P.E.S. and may we each realize the urgency in bringing our lost friends to Christ.

Dan. 12:3, "And those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky above; and those who turn many to righteousness, like the stars forever and ever."

Doug's Discussion

Empty Spaces

Empty space gets filled. Have you never noticed this phenomenon when you move into a larger house? You think to yourself "oh, I'll have so much room now!" But no . . . as time goes on various things encroach upon that space. You THOUGHT you were going to have a home office? Joke's on you when it becomes your wife's craft storage room. If you have empty space you might want to figure out what you want to do with it fairly quickly, or someone else might make that decision for you.

Jesus once told a story of a man who finally got rid of an evil spirit. However, the departure of the spirit left an empty space. Then the spirit says "'I will return to the house I left.' When it arrives, it finds the house unoccupied, swept clean and put in order. Then it goes and takes with it seven other spirits more wicked than itself, and they go in and live there. And the final condition of that man is worse than the first" (Matthew 12:43-45). Empty space gets filled – and often it gets filled with junk . . . or worse. This man's problem was that the house was "unoccupied." But if someone else was already there He would have told the evil spirits to take a hike.

We all have to make decisions about what is going to fill the spaces in our lives. If we don't make the decision the decision gets made for us. So . . . as for my house, may it be filled with the Lord! If you notice that you have a free half hour in the morning – decide what you'll spent it on. Why not make that a devotional time to start the day off right? I think that would benefit you greatly, but you have to decide to use that space for that purpose. Otherwise something else, perhaps something much less wholesome, will come in to gobble that

half hour up. Then your final condition is worse than if you never had that half-hour free to begin with.

If there is junk in your life clear it out. But don't just leave the space empty – fill it with what is good. May God fill us with His goodness so there is no room for evil in our lives. May we all decide that empty spaces belong to God.

Powerful Words

On my frequent trips to the city, I've been watching the progress of a large building, like a Kmart store, being demolished. Although on the interstate when I passed this project, I would still slow down for an extra glimpse of the wrecking crane as it ripped through the concrete walls and metal roof.


The other day, when I passed, it was gone. The roof and walls had been crushed and loaded onto trucks until the last load of rubble was hauled away. As I pondered this sight, it reminded me how easy it is to demolish. It doesn't take much skill or wisdom to tear down. One doesn't need to read a blueprint or give attention to details. All it requires is brute power, usually a strong back and a sturdy sledgehammer will do the trick for small jobs.

When it comes to the matter of a Christian's influence upon others, the Bible is quite clear that we are not to be in the business of demolition, but edification, i.e. building up. For instance, in Ephesians 4:29 it's written, *"Let no unwholesome word proceed from your mouth, but only such a word as is good for edification according to the need of the moment, so that it will give grace to those who hear."*

But, one might argue, "Demolition is so easy." And, it is . All it takes are a few power words, like "failure," "hopeless," "ugly," "bad" and "worthless." There doesn't have to be any affection or carefully measured words of encouragement. It takes only a few blows of the tongue, even in gossip, to become the sledgehammer blows that shatter hearts.

May we all give care to what we say! To tear down the spirit and worth of another takes no godliness at all. To batter down those already discouraged by troubles is about the easiest task one will ever find. On the other hand, to be a masterful builder of men, to inspire love and edification to God in those we meet, is to be like Christ Himself.
