Today is the day the Lord has made

There is a story told of a wise man who was being pursued by a ferocious tiger. He raced to the edge of the cliff, glanced back, and saw the growling tiger about to spring. The wise man spotted a rope dangling over the edge of the cliff. He grabbed it and began shimmying down the side of the cliff out of the clutches of the tiger. Whew! Narrow escape.

He stared down and saw a huge quarry of jagged rocks five hundred feet below. He looked up and saw the tiger poised atop the cliff with bared claws. Just then, two mice began to nibble at the rope. What to do? The wise man saw a strawberry within arm's reach growing out of the face of the cliffside. He plucked it, ate it, and exclaimed, "Yum-yum; that's the best strawberry l've ever tasted in my entire life." (Taken from Brennan Manning, *The Ragamuffin Gospel, pg.54*).

Moral of the story: If he had been preoccupied with the rock below (the future) or the tiger above (the past), he would have missed the strawberry God had given him in the present moment.

We must remember that today is the most important day we have because it may be the only day we have. James stresses the importance of today by saying in James 4:13-15, "Come now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go into such and such a town and spend a year there and trade and make a profit"— yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that."



P.M. Sermon: Doug Wells Don't Stop on the Steps Scripture Reading: Acts 22:16

Doug's Discussion

Can't Not Talk

What would you say are the top two conversation topics people are told to avoid? You can talk about weather, no problem. The latest gossip is in. But don't talk about politics or religion. Right? And out of those two my experience says that people are more comfortable talking politics than religion. In American culture religion has become a conversation ender. It leads to "oh, you're one of those people" looks. A lot of people don't mind if you have faith but they mind you expressing it to them quite a bit. I find this all very unfortunate. The Christian faith is meant to be expressed. It is like a fire that cannot be held in. As Jeremiah said, "if I say, 'I will not mention his word or speak anymore in his name,' his word is in my heart like a fire, a fire shut up in my bones. I am weary of holding it in; indeed, I cannot" (20:9).

There are choices that have to be made about what kind of faith we're going to have. The world forces this choice upon us. Jesus calls us to speak up and the world calls us to be quiet. A real Christian faith is expressed in many ways: in character, in deeds, and definitely in words. Is that our faith, or do we live a kind of life that makes it really hard to tell that we're a Christian? Have we been conformed to the world's idea that religion should not be talked about? Or are we molded by a higher power? "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will" (Romans 12:2).

Listen world, I get it. Talking about religion gets a lot of people really worked up. When someone says "don't talk about politics or religion" it might have been said out of a desire for peace. Uncle Bob and cousin Fred started talking about reli-



gion last year at the family picnic and the resulting fight ruined the whole day. Sure. But I don't want a false peace, I want real peace – for myself and for you. I will happily endure some dirty looks and cranky people now if the gospel message might bring someone true and everlasting peace later. So no, I will not be quiet about Jesus, no matter what Uncle Bob thinks. Sorry man, I can't. The Word of God is like a fire in my bones. I am weary of holding it in, indeed I cannot. Praise Jesus!

Who is your Barnabas, Paul, and Timothy?

Most young boys admire and look up to their father as they are growing up. I was no different. I wanted to be just like my father. Grow up to be strong, smart, funny, kind, loving, honest, hard working, a farmer, and many other things just like my father as I got older. As a little boy, a teenager, a young man, and even today, I look to my father as one to emulate.

I know that I was extremely blessed to have the loving, kind parents that mentored me. We all need mentors in our lives. Whether it be parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, siblings, cousins, other relatives, friends, neighbors, etc., we all need people in our lives that we can look up to. Jeff Jenkins recently said in a leadership training at South Green St., "Everyone needs at least one Barnabas, one Paul, and one Timothy in their life." That phrase has stuck with me over the last couple of months since hearing it.

<u>One Barnabas</u>—As humans we all love to be encouraged. Encouragement from others is sometimes the only thing that gets us through difficult times. Barnabas was a man of encouragement. We need to have in our life someone that is reaching out to encourage and uplift others. They are selfless and always looking to others' needs before their own.

<u>One Paul</u>—We need someone in our lives that has been through it before. Someone that we can go to when we need advice, guidance, or help with a problem/struggle that we are experiencing. Paul was a mentor to Timothy. Paul had seen it and experienced it. He was willing to lend advice and council to Timothy as Timothy was growing in the ministry.

<u>One Timothy</u>—As was just mentioned, Timothy was advised by Paul while he was a young man doing the work of the Lord. He was willing to listen and take the advice of Paul and use it. We need someone in our lives that challenges us to be the example that we should be. We need to have someone in our lives that we are looking to help and make a difference in their life.
