CURRY CONNECTION

Submission

“Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him...” (Isa 53:10a ESV). The full extent of the suffering that the Roman crucifixion produced is truly unimaginable for us today. Why did He endure the pain of the whips, the shame of being exposed before all, the cruelty of being left to hang on a cross to die? Why did He sacrifice Himself not only to die but to the torture? “(L)ooking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God” (Heb 12:2 NKJV).

Jesus wanted to fulfill the will of His Father (John 6:38) and save the world from our sin, “... who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross...” (Heb 12:2c). However, at the exact moment He was “...despising the shame...” (Heb 12:2d). Elsewhere in the Scripture we can witness through Jesus’ own words that He would have preferred another route. “(S)aying, ‘Father, if it is Your will, take this cup away from Me; nevertheless not My will, but Yours, be done” (Luke 22:42). Why is it that Jesus continued performing the will of another?

Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross. (Phil 2:5-8)

Have you placed much thought into what submission is? The Lamb who was led to the slaughter and opened not His mouth is the perfect example and definition of what submission is. To many people, this word, submission, causes the indigestion of pride to boil inside of them because they liken the verb to things such as oppression. The world correctly defines the word “(1) a: to yield to governance or authority b: to subject to a condition, treatment, or operation.”¹ One scholarly source defines ὑποτάσσω (translated as submitting) as “to cause to be in a submissive relationship, to subject, to subordinate.”²

Submission by definition of man and action of Christ is to surrender yourself and your will to the will of another. If we were only submitting to God on matters we agree with, then we were never in submission to Him. We were only agreeing with Him at times. At the moment when His will doesn’t necessarily align with yours, but you obey anyway, you are genuinely in submission. Our submission to God can be tested at moments of loving our enemies (Matt 5:44), bearing one another’s burdens (Gal 6:1), submitting to one another (Eph 5:21), repenting of sin (Luke 13:3), or obeying the will of God (Heb 5:9).

Jesus endured the will of the Father because He, as a good Son, was in submission to His Father (Eph 6:1; 1 Tim 3:4). We asked why, but now let us end with how. How was the Son able to submit to the Father? It was because He loved who He was in submission to. “But that the world may know that I love the Father, and as the Father gave Me commandment, so I do. Arise, let us go from here” (John 14:31). Do you love enough to be in submission (John 14:15)?

A. Is there a Grinch in the family—someone self-centered and disruptive?

a. "If I want to heal relationship problems, I can't set out to change other people. I must first seek to change myself."

b. His brothers eventually believed, showcasing hope amidst family discord.

c. While change isn't always possible, living a faithful Christian life brings peace.

d. Adopt Jesus's principles in daily life to heal family rifts.

Our best role in family discord is living faithfully setting an example of Christ's love.

Hope in transformation exists when guided by Christ.

DOUG'S DISCUSSION

Carefully Chosen Comparisons

If I were to confine myself to a certain group of people, I would be an amazing basketball player. I could be the star of the team, I could score thirty to fifty points a game, and I could humiliate opposing players by consistently blocking their shots right back into their faces. How do I accomplish these marvelous feats? Easy. All I have to do is invite my ten-year-old daughter's class over for a game of basketball. Don't judge me. If I were playing people my own size, my lack of athletic ability and cartilage-free left knee would keep me from doing much of anything.

The point is that who you are comparing yourself really matters. I may be able to maintain the delusion that I am Michael Jordan in one scenario, but that idea quickly falls apart when the comparison changes. This is worth considering in many areas of life. Do you believe that you are a fantastic Christian person? In fact, do you believe that you are so holy that there really isn't anything left for you to work on? Wow . . . I certainly hope that you're right! But how did you come to your conclusions? One way you can achieve that perspective is by comparing yourself to people who are considerably less righteous than yourself. You're a decent person, right? You don't have to drive far before you come across people marching for mass murder. Compared to that, I suspect you do look holy. It doesn't even have to be that extreme. As long as you're around people who are pretty even with your efforts, you'll still feel pretty good about yourself. Come to church with a bunch of people who mumble out the praise and don't really get involved, and you'll probably feel just fine about doing the same.

The Bible has something to say about what standard we use to judge. 1 Corinthians 10:12 says, "We do not dare to classify or compare ourselves with some who commend themselves. When they measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves with themselves, they are not wise." Paul went on to say that he would use the mission God had assigned to Him as his standard. Was he doing what God wanted him to do, living how God wanted him to live? That meant more to Paul than how everyone else was living. I think this is a good example for us as well. We can justify what we are doing based on who we are comparing ourselves. When that comparison shifts to God, our desire to grow never fades. After all, "it is not the one who commends himself who is approved, but the one whom the Lord commends" (2 Corinthians 10:18).


